Essential Question: How can an author show cause and effect relationships between events in a story?

Comprehension Strategies: Cause and Effect

Cause and Effect is a connection between two or more events in which one event brings about another. The event that happens first is the cause; the one that follows is the effect.

Wondering: What is the immediate effect of Keira writing a fairy tale with her grandmother's pen? Predict long term effects of her actions?

Writing Activity: Write about a time when you made a decision with disastrous consequences. How did you handle that situation? Would you have done things differently?

Discussion and Activities for Chapters 6-10

Essential Question: How does an author develop a character's personality through the use of writing elements?

Comprehension Strategies: Analyze Character

Character analysis is the combination of personality traits, thoughts, description, and speech patterns that determine how a character acts and reacts.

Writing Activity:

In chapter 7, Ms. Teppernat tells Keira to "Channel her inner Cinderella." Think about why this task was so difficult for Keira due to her personality. Now choose one character from *The Princess and the Page* and draw or find a picture of the type of shoe that would represent that character. Finally, write a paragraph describing why that shoe represents that character and is a symbol of their strengths and weaknesses.

Questions

for Chapters 6-10

- 1. On page 45, why is Mrs. Harding, Keira's mom, so determined to blame the events from the previous night on a storm? Do you think she's right?

Discussion and Activities for Chapters 11-16

Essential Question: How is reality and fantasy reflected in the events of the story?

Comprehension Strategies: Reality and Fantasy

Reality has events that deal with things that are true to life while **fantasy** has characters, settings, or events that could not happen in real life.

Activity: Throughout the story, Keira is pulled into a fantasy realm of her own creation and then back to the real world. When she first enters the fairy tale realm, she doesn't realize it. But then characters, events, and the setting give her clues. Cite examples of this that you have found so far within the story. Brainstorm with a partner other stories, poems, movies, or songs that have a fantasy realm connected to the real world and create a graphic organizer showing your results.

Writing Activity:

In *The Princess and the Page*, Keira changes history through her magical pen. Pick one historical event and write a story based off that event, but change the ending to be something that you make up. With a highlighter, go back through and highlight the sections that are fantasy.

Comprehension Strategies: Make Inferences and Draw Conclusions

Inferences are when we figure things out based on our experiences. **To draw conclusions** is to take information that is implied or inferred and come to a decision about it.

Activity: Choose a fairy tale. Put three to five items that symbolize elements or objects from that tale into a paper bag. Pass it to a friend and have them use those clues and their own previous knowledge to draw a conclusion to which fairy tale you chose. *Example*: Fairy tale: Snow White. Items: apple, mirror, axe.

Inferences: Sleuthing for Readers!
